Interconnect 7 housing areas, 2 parks, 3 schools, the Great Mall, BART Transit Center, and thousands of jobs with 24/7 on-demand non-stop service.

Yosemite/Curtis bike/pedestrian crossing identified in 3 City Plans, but never implemented.

Connect The Pines residential area with a crossing of railroad tracks and creek.

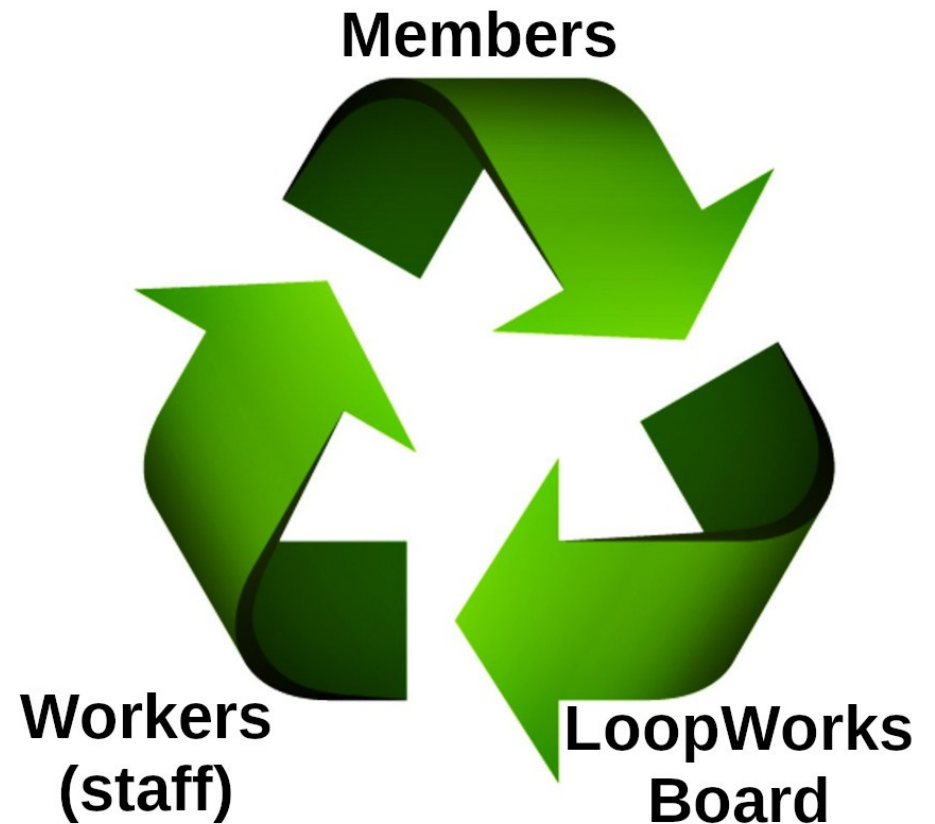
- Always there for you when needed
